A Letter from our President & CEO

Dear Friend.

Washington County Health System has had a very rewarding year. We have worked on healthcare projects that will improve the well-being of community residents and we have been recognized for achievements in special areas.

This year, we launched three new services. Total Rehab Care at Robinwood began a program called Vision Restoration Therapy. It helps patients who have had a stroke or brain injury improve their vision. The Center for Vascular Care opened to provide screening, diagnosis, treatment, and follow-up care for those with peripheral vascular disease. The Center for Clinical Research offers clinical trials in conjunction with local physicians, bringing access to the latest medical research to our patients.



The hospital constantly evaluates how to partner with physicians in providing patient care. This spring, we began a hospitalist program for inpatients. Hospitalists are specialists in hospital systems and the provision of acute care. They treat patients who are admitted through the emergency department without a primary care physician. They also care for patients when requested by their primary care physicians.

We received three awards that recognized our commitment to excellence in healthcare. Verispan acknowledged us as a Top 100 Integrated Health Network. The Hagerstown-Washington County Chamber of Commerce awarded our efforts in workforce development, especially in training and financing educational opportunities. We were one of 185 hospitals to receive the Organ Donation Medal of Honor from the United States Department of Health and Human Services in recognition of the families who donated organs and tissues of loved-ones for transplant.

The health system has continued its commitment to providing accessible healthcare as well as important health education activities. We have contributed almost \$16 million in community benefits over the course of the year. You will read more about them in the following pages.

Our dedicated medical staff, health system employees, and volunteers work diligently in bringing the best care to our patients. This year, we will be opening the special care level II nursery on the Family Birthing Center. Now, we can care for babies born at 32 weeks gestation or those who need medical care-right here in Washington County.

We will also open up a number of services at the new Sylvania Building on Pennsylvania Avenue. There will be a second Urgent Care Center, a Home Care Pharmacy with Equipped For Life, and a Hagerstown Medical Lab draw site. They will offer easier access to healthcare services for our patients who live on the north end of Washington County.

The health system's commitment to providing the very best in healthcare to our patients is a challenging and rewarding task. We will continue to evaluate programs and services that can benefit the residents of our community. And, we will develop those that hold the bright promise of a healthier future for all of us.

Charitable Community Care Report

Washington County Health System is committed to being responsive to the healthcare needs of the residents of our community. We do this through a variety of activities. For some activities we receive payment, but for many others we are not reimbursed for all or part of our costs. They are considered community benefits – services that we provide because they address community healthcare needs and priorities.

In fiscal year 2005 (July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005), Washington County Health System contributed more than \$16 million in community benefits to residents of the tri-state area. Those contributions went toward programs such as stop-smoking efforts, helping individuals improve their health, and educating current and future healthcare providers.

Washington County Hospital, the acute care arm of Washington County Health System, is one of the lowest cost providers of hospital care in Maryland. The hospital is a not-for-profit provider challenged to meet increasing medical care demands in a growing community. Our obligation is to provide critical healthcare services as efficiently as possible, while enhancing the well-being of community residents and bringing healthcare education to both medical professionals and community members.

Washington County Hospital and Antietam Health Services, a sister organization under the health system, work closely with community partners to provide free or reduced-cost services to those who need them. Antietam Health Services was created to partner with other healthcare providers to offer medical services such as diagnostic imaging, laboratory services, and durable medical equipment. It also includes physician practices, which specialize in family practice, internal medicine, and women's health.

We are proud of our health system employees who share their knowledge, skills, resources, and time with others. Whether they are serving on local boards of directors, teaching a healthcare class or mentoring a youth group, they generously represent the health system to our community.

On the following pages, you will find information about how Washington County Health System uses its resources to improve the well-being of our community's residents. Listed are just a few of the many activities that help make the tri-state region a healthier place to live, work, and raise a family.

Caring for the Individual

Washington County Health System has a long history of providing healthcare for those who cannot care for themselves. For the past 100 years the hospital and more recently Antietam Health Services have provided medically-necessary care to many individuals. Here are some examples.

For Those in Need

- 174 patients, who were discharged to the community without insurance or financial means to pay for services, received prescriptions, oxygen, medical equipment, and home infusions at no cost to them.
- 2,192 patients received free transportation by the hospital courtesy van to home after discharge, to breast cancer screening clinics or to Healthy Family educational programs.
- 1,538 calls were made to patients with respiratory disease to review their symptoms, medications, and side effects with healthcare providers.
- 7,724 pounds of laundry were washed and dried at Washington County Hospital for use by the REACH cold weather shelter.
- 1,200 holiday meals were delivered to those who might not have a meal by emergency department doctors, hospital staff, and volunteers.

Individual Well-being

- 4,401 people called the hospital's emergency department telephone triage line for help in deciding if they should go to the emergency room or to their physicians' office for medical care.
- 180 children learned about bike safety at the hospital's annual Bike Safety Rodeo.
- 391 people participated in blood pressure screenings offered by hospital staff.

Health Education

- 52 weeks of important health information was shared with WJEJ radio listeners on the hospital's talk show program, *Health Matters*.
- 1,100 first grade students participated in an educational opportunity to learn about what happens when patients come to the hospital.
- 4 issues of Health Focus, the quarterly Washington County Hospital magazine on healthcare topics, were delivered to households in the tri-state region.

Women and Children

- 218 women received free breast cancer screenings through a partnership with Washington County Hospital, the Maryland Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, Breast Cancer Awareness of the Cumberland Valley, Washington County Health Department Breast and Cervical Cancer Program, and Washington County/Hagerstown C-SAFE.
- 35% of the patients seen at the Women's Health Center, an Antietam Health Service practice, are uninsured, underinsured or Medicaid patients.
- 137 moms received support services from a licensed social worker on issues like nicotine cessation, domestic violence, drug and alcohol use, and mental health services through the OB Care Coordinator Program.

Trauma Care

patients from Washington and Frederick Counties, and the surrounding areas were treated at the Washington County Hospital trauma center. The hospital underwrites \$2,912,323 to maintain the trauma program.

Caring for the Community

Caring through Community Partnerships

- 101 parish nurses in 43 faith communities assisted members of their congregations with health concerns. The hospital's parish nursing program offers them educational opportunities, mentoring, and support for their activities.
- \$40,986 was pledged to the United Way by health system employees to fund programs in 20 agencies that serve the residents of Washington County.

Caring for the Next Generation of Healthcare Professionals

- 77 young people participated in the Healthcare Career Explorer program hosted by Washington County Hospital to learn about healthcare career opportunities.
- 16 undergraduate students shadowed radiation and chemotherapy nurses at the John R. Marsh Cancer Center to learn about the clinical aspects of assessing and treating cancer patients.
- 29 young people participated in the North High School Medical Academy to learn about health career opportunities.
- 99 undergraduate pharmacy students from the University of Maryland and Shenandoah University participated in learning experiences with mentors from Washington County Hospital as part of their clinical rotations.

Charitable Care Activities and Contributions

Washington County Health System believes that the health of every individual in our community is important. In fiscal year 2005, we contributed our financial resources to the health of our community. Listed below are the categories of charitable care activities that we supported.

Medical Practices

Through general and specialty medical practices, designed to meet the healthcare needs of the community, we provided prenatal, delivery, and postnatal care to virtually all of the medical assistance, uninsured maternity patients in the county. We also offer behavioral health services and endocrinology services without regard for the ability to pay.

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
